



Tournament Information



- The 2014 Chess State Tournament will mark the fourth year as an IESA activity.
- The tournament is a two day event taking place on Friday, February 28 and Saturday, March 1.
- For the second consecutive year, the Bone Student Center on the campus of Illinois State University will play host the Chess State Tournament.
- The entry deadline for the tournament is January 29th, with an entry fee of \$15.00 per student.



Tournament Format



- New in 2014 is a change within the competition format, as the Chess State
 Tournament will now be conducted in an Individual/Team Swiss System format
 with designated playing boards eliminated.
- Coaches now enter students into either the 7th grade division or the 8th grade division.
- As a reminder, only students in grades 5-8 are eligible for IESA competition.
 A coach may enter a maximum of 7 students in each division as in previous years, with no player substitutions permitted after the start of Round 1.
- All competitors will continue to participate in all 7 rounds of competition.
- State tournament appeals process:
 - 1.) Coaches are responsible for round results during the following round. Any resultnot corrected by two pairings will not be changed to increase team or individual standings.
 - Coaches will have 20 minutes after the posting of final results to report any corrections.



Awards



- Individual awards and team awards will be given in each
- Trophies will be presented to the teams in each division winning first, second, third, and fourth places.
 Medallions will be presented to the members and head coach of the first four placing teams
- Individual awards will be presented to players in each division scoring 5.0 or more points.
 - Gold Individuals scoring 7.0 points or next highest score.
 - Silver Individuals scoring 6.0 6.5 points.
 - Bronze Individuals scoring 5.0 5.5 points.

Equipment



- New for the 2014 Chess State Tournament, each school will be asked to provide chess boards, Staunton design chess sets, and digital chess time delay clocks that comply with the rules published by the IESA for more than half of the individuals they have participating.
 - RATIONALE: With the elimination of boards, additional equipment must be supplied by the participating schools.

 Standard time delay is preferred.

 Analog clocks are acceptable substitutes but not preferred.
 Failure to provide the required equipment may result in the forfeiture of Boards which are without proper equipment.

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IESA Chess Requirements



- Understand how to use a chess clock. (set and adjust time)
- Time Control
- In the Chess State Tournament, each player will be granted a time control of forty (40) minutes with 5 second delay per player.

 Note: A digital clock using standard time delay is the preferred clock. Digital clocks are not to be used without the time delay being correctly set. (Count down does not start for 5 seconds)

 Understand the term "chess notation", which refers to a system to
- keep track of your matches.

 - Replay them to study tactics, understand mistakes etc. 20-4: Algebraic Notation describes squares and moves by use of a grid system of numbers and lower case letters.

Chess Rules Your Kids Should Know

- 2-1: The chessboard is composed of 64 equal squares, alternately light (the "white" squares) and dark (the "black" squares).

 7-3: Once a move is determined, the opponent may make his/her move, but the player still retains all rights to make draw offers or claims of draws.
- 12-5: The game is drawn upon demand by one of the players when the same position appears three times, provided that the same player has the move after each of the three appearances of the same position on the chessboard.
 - This is three identical occurrences of the position, not just repeating
- 12-6: The game is drawn when a player having the move demonstrates that at least fifty moves have been made by each side without the capture of any chessman or the movement of any
- 14-1: Failure to use a clock when one is available or made available is sufficient grounds for forfeiture.

What To Expect At The IESA **Tournament**

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- Efforts will be made to avoid pairing teammates; however, teammates may be paired to avoid shifting players out of a score group.
 Player ratings will be calculated after the conclusion of Round 4 to be used in pairing the remaining rounds of tournament play.
- Report scores to scores table before leaving the competition floor.
- Round results will be posted after each round PLEASE REVIEW
- The skittles room (leisure room) will be assigned prior to the tournament.
- Following play, please report back to your skittles room.
- Bring pencils

 Participants will be allowed to use their own.
 Awards Ceremony will begin at 3pm on Saturday.
